## What is the difference between a BA/BFA in visual communication design?

A BFA degree is a professional degree offering the opportunity to develop depth and specialization in a creative art practice. Conversely, a BA degree is a general studies degree offering breadth of understanding through exposure to an area of artistic activity; a minor or focus* outside the major is required for a BA to help achieve this. A minor or focus is not required for the BFA degree. The degrees vary slightly in total number of credits required (BA: 121 credits; BFA: 122 credits); the main difference is in the make-up of the requirements.

The BFA degree is preferred by the profession, the AIGA (the American Institute for Graphic Arts - the largest professional association of visual communication designers), and the accrediting agency NASAD (the National Association of Schools of Art and Design). The Visual Communication Design BFA degree at Northern Kentucky University offers a deep, comprehensive scope of study and a competitive advantage in portfolio development. The degree carries a level of distinction, and as such, has requirements for eligibility and elevated standards for completion. A student interested in obtaining the BFA must have a cumulative, overall GPA of 2.5 to be eligible. Students must maintain these GPA minimums until graduation to obtain a BFA. Students apply the BFA program in the junior year of design studies by registering for ART 299 Portfolio Review.

## What is the most appropriate minor for a design major?

There is no minor in particular that is expected by the profession. When choosing a minor, a student should choose a subject that could align them with a specific design niche they wish to pursue, and/or that they personally feel is interesting and stimulating. Some suggested minors for a Visual Communication Designer major: Anthropology, English, Entrepreneurship, Geography (or other sciences), Marketing, Media Informatics, Philosophy, Popular Culture Studies, and Women and Gender Studies.

## What is the "Experiential Component" (ArtV 496)?

This is language the university uses to describe both internship and co-op opportunities. The term "internship" refers to a part-time position (i.e.,
20 hours of work per week for a semester) equivalent to 3 credit hours. "Co-op" refers to a full-time position (i.e., 40 of work per week for a semester) equivalent to 6 credit hours.

## What paperwork do I need to complete in order to graduate?

When a student anticipates graduation, they must file an "Application for Degree Candidacy" form and a "Program Certification" form through the Registrar approximately half-way through the semester before they intend to graduate (refer to the Registrar for specific deadlines). Your major advisor must review and sign the Program Certification form prior to the Registrar's graduation application deadline. Consult your catalog and the Office of the Registrar for additional details.

## What about a career in illustration?

Sometimes students who want to work in the design industry discover that they prefer to accelarate in drawing or painting compared to design. These students should consider a career in illustration. Illustration is closely associated with the design industry because illustrators, like some photographers, are commissioned to create artwork for commercial projects coordinated by visual communication designers. Drawing, painting, intermedia, printmaking and new media art, among others, are good areas of study for this field of practice.

*focus: Formerly called an area of concentration. A focus is 4 courses (12 credits) with the same prefix chosen by the student at the 300+ level outside of the major; for example, four 300+ courses in GEO (GEO 301, GEO 306, GEO 314, GEO 415).

## General Education Frequently Asked Questions

1. What will be covered in each general education course?

- Every syllabus for a general education course will include the relevant student learning outcomes. See https://inside.nku.edu/gened.html. When you search for a course in the myNKU Registration UI there is a course description for each class. This information can also be found in the Undergraduate catalog.

2. Can one course be used for multiple categories?

- No double dipping: students cannot use the same course to satisfy two categories (i.e., ANT 100 cannot be used to complete "Individual \& Society" and "Global Viewpoints"). The only exception to this is ENG 151H, which fulfills both "Written I" and "Written II."
- Often courses can be used to fulfill both general education and major or minor requirements. However, several majors and minors do not allow this form of double dipping or have requirements for courses that cannot be used for general education. Please check with an academic advisor.

3. Can two courses from the same discipline be used to satisfy a category requiring multiple classes?

- No. Only one discipline (course prefix) can be taken per category (the top, dark grey box) other than in "Communication."
- Three courses from three different disciplines must be taken in "Scientific \& Quantitative Inquiry" (one from "Mathematics \& Statistics," one "Natural Science with a Lab," and one additional "Natural Science").
- Three courses from three different disciplines must be taken in "Self \& Society" (one from "Cultural Pluralism" and two from "Individual \& Society").
- Two courses from two different disciplines must be taken from "Culture \& Creativity." Note, for this rule, all foreign language courses count as a single discipline. Two foreign language classes cannot be used to fulfill this requirement.
For example, a student might count SOC 100 in "Individual \& Society" and SOC 101 in "Global Viewpoints," but cannot count them as "Individual \& Society" and "Cultural Pluralism" (both being part of the "Self \& Society" category).

4. How long does a student have to complete the "Mathematics \& Statistics" and "Communication" requirements?

- ENG 101 should be completed by the time the student earns 30 credit hours. Other "Mathematics \& Statistics" and "Communication" requirements should be completed by the time the student earns 45 credit hours.

5. What if a student has academic deficiencies?

- Students admitted with NKU, CPE, and/or PCC deficiencies (admission requirements) must be enrolled in the appropriate course their first year and are highly encouraged to take any academic deficiencies during the first semester. Please check with an academic advisor.

6. Do the new general education courses on this checklist count if a student took them last year?

- No, new courses approved as general education for Fall 2018 only fulfill Foundation of Knowledge requirements if taken Fall 2018 or later.

7. If a student is part of the Honors College, does this change any general education requirements?

- Honors College students beginning at NKU in Fall 18 or later will complete about half of their general education courses through an alternative honors curriculum and half using this traditional checklist. Please contact the Honors College for specifics.
